As hard as the past few months have been, a silver lining has been Americans' willingness to help each other.

People see the needs the pandemic has caused. They sense what it's like to lose someone or to lose your job or business, even if it's not happened to them.

This severely limits what many charities can do, just when they're most needed.

Having a little deducted from every paycheck makes a huge difference for charities, giving them stable income throughout the year.

How many charities? How much is given?

- In 2015 there were more than 1.184 million charities. However, most are inactive or have virtually no income. Only about **300,000 charities** filed tax forms.
- In 2019, giving to charities totaled nearly **\$450 billion**, according to Giving USA. **Individuals** gave nearly \$310 billion, 69% of all giving. **Foundations** gave more than \$75 billion, 17% of total giving.
- Fewer Americans are giving: **73%** in Gallup's 2020 survey. The previous low was 79% in 2009, during the recession.

How to save a child's life for \$80.50

The statistic is abstract and hard to fully grasp: 3.4 million children are suffering today from malnutrition in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

The boy, Iragi, is anything but abstract and hard to grasp.

"When we met Iragi, he hadn't eaten for days and was literally starving to death," says Kristy Scott, director of **Children's Food Fund/World Emergency Relief** (CFF/WER). "He had the body of a five-year-old and was in serious danger of organ failure." At the time, Iragi was 12.

Iragi was rushed to Lwiro Hospital and admitted to CFF/WER's malnutrition

program, allowing him to receive critical medical and nutritional care, all free.

It takes a long time for a child as malnourished as Iragi to recover. He was in WER's malnutrition program for three months, but is now back with his family and doing much better.

Scott estimates that three months of nutritional support for a child like Iragi costs just \$80.50. The cost is low because CFF/WER gets much of the food donated, plus they work with dedicated doctors and nurses who provide health care in villages around Lwiro and Kaziba.

CFF/WER (CFC #10984) works this way in 15 countries, mostly in Africa and Asia. Through its Native American outreach, it also provides food, water barrels and firewood to Navajo, Apache and Hopi populations. So far in 2020, it has shipped nearly four million pounds of disaster and COVID-19 relief supplies across the U.S. to help struggling Americans.

CFF/WER provides not just food but also life-saving medicine, water filters and agricultural supplies, with an overhead of less than 8% of donated resources.

For Scott, who's worked with CFF/ WER for more than 30 years, the key is being aware of the causes of poverty and malnutrition and being able to focus on tangible solutions for real people and their communities.

"The extraordinary scale of suffering in a country like DR Congo is horrifying," Scott says. "Violence, hunger and disease are ever

present. It breaks my heart to have to admit that we can't save all the children.

"But seeing the impact of our efforts on children like Iragi is what keeps me going. It can be heart-breaking work, but also incredibly rewarding to know you've made a difference."

The Nature Conservancy Partners with U.S. Navy Personnel for **Anacostia River Clean-up**

One of many ways TNC works to conserve the lands and water on which all life depends

Through strategic partnerships and cleanup efforts, the Anacostia River is becoming the invaluable natural resource the DC area needs.

In July 2019, an opportunity arose for The Nature Conservancy to collaborate with retiring U.S. Navy JAGC Commander Laura Bishop on a cleanup of Kingman Island and Heritage Island, two areas located directly on the Anacostia River.

Commander Bishop specialized in environmental law over her 20-year tenure with the Navy, and in lieu of a traditional retirement ceremony, Laura decided to organize a cleanup effort inspired by her passion for nature.

The Nature Conservancy (CFC# 10643) was thrilled to be a partner since TNC has worked diligently to reduce the amount of stormwater pollution flowing into the Anacostia River. Through innovative and strategic partnerships, TNC has designed

and implemented green infrastructures meant to capture polluted runoff throughout the District.

The Anacostia River is a little over eight miles long and flows through both Maryland and Washington, DC, providing recreational opportunities to the community and valuable habitat to creatures of the natural world. Unfortunately, the watershed has suffered a long history of pollution from various industries.

On Thursday July 25, 2019, thanks to Commander Bishop's leadership, a group of volunteers with diverse military backgrounds banded together to remove trash from the Anacostia, specifically on the banks of Kingman Island and Heritage

Island, both owned by the nonprofit Living Classrooms.

Throughout the morning, these military volunteers rolled up their sleeves and collected approximately 50 bags of trash, making the Anacostia River just a little cleaner.

TNC's veteran employee resource group, Veterans in Nature's Service (VINS), supports veteran employees and employees with veteran family members, while also promoting job opportunities for veterans. TNC has a long history of working with veterans all over the country on everything from volunteer events like this one to veteran family retreats. Learn more at Nature.org. How charities are responding to the pandemic

Nearly every charity in the country has been affected by the pandemic, even if they're not directly responding to it. Just in the past six months, nearly a million nonprofit jobs were lost, according to a recent report.

One reason for this is that charities run like businesses in some ways, receiving revenue from their activities (such as ticket sales) as well as contracts to run programs (such as a drug rehab program supported by a city government). Like businesses, many charities have lost revenue during the pandemic, leading to program cuts and job losses.

t the same time, many charities are facing an unprecedented need for their services. This need has gotten a lot of attention in relation to food banks, most of which are serving far more people than in the past. But many other types of charities are also having to find ways to respond to the pandemic's impact on the people they help.

One example is charities helping people with diabetes and other kidney problems. These people "are facing enormous risks and challenges," said the president of the American Kidney Fund.

"They are losing their jobs. They have had to stop using public transit to get to their treatments.. Patients with compromised immune systems need help obtaining groceries and other essentials safely."

In the DC area, the Arlington Free Clinic (CFC #86926) says that many of the patients it serves "have already lost their

jobs in construction, restaurants, cleaning and childcare and are struggling with access to food, transportation and other emergency needs. Very few will benefit from federal government support."

The \$300 Donation Deduction

To encourage giving to charities during this time of crisis, the CARES Act created a \$300 deduction that anyone who doesn't itemize their deductions — about 85% of Americans — can take.

This deduction is only for this year. Donations must be in cash, not donations of items such as clothes or furniture. No special documentation is needed, just a record of your donation, such as a canceled check.

Charities have been urging Congress to pass a permanent charitable deduction for nonitemizers. The 2017 tax overhaul doubled the standard deduction. As a result, far fewer people itemize their deductions. Many believe this has depressed charitable giving.

Food For The Poor (CFC #10328)

Since mid-March, Food For The Poor has shipped 709 tractor-trailer loads of aid to the countries it serves, including 200 containers specifically for COVID-19 relief. FFTP focuses on Caribbean and Latin American countries.

Humane Society of the U.S. (CFC #11894)

The Humane Society launched the COVID-19 Relief Fund to support animal shelters, rescue groups and other organizations that are responding to the economic impacts of the COVID-19 outbreak. Its goal is to keep people and their pets together during this crisis.
