

What do the CFC's many changes mean for you?

The CFC underwent major changes in 2017 designed to streamline the campaign and make giving easier and more efficient. Here's what these changes mean for you:

- You now have a simple way to make your CFC pledge online. There is one central website that processes your donation: CFCgiving.opm.gov. You can make your pledge now.
- There are fewer charities. Charities must now pay an application fee, which has caused many charities that raised little or nothing through the CFC to drop out.
- You can still choose from hundreds of charities, doing all kinds of charity work. The broad range of charities you can learn about and support through the CFC has long been one of its best features.

- You can search for charities online, in many ways.
 The simplest way to support a charity in this guide is to input its 5-digit CFC number.
 - You can choose to volunteer through the CFC and have your time count as a contribution.
 - Charities still must meet a series of accountability standards, such as an annual audit (*except for very small charities*).
 - Retirees can now give through the CFC. They can have a little deducted from each annuity payment.

Help us respond to needs of animals during natural disasters...and whenever animals are at risk

Earlier this year, a devastating tornado tore through Alabama, the deadliest tornado in the U.S. since 2013. The destruction was enormous, extending over 70 miles.

In response, the **Humane Society of the United States** Animal Rescue Team was on the ground quickly, coordinating efforts to empty local shelters of unowned, adoptable animals, allowing these organizations to respond to urgent community needs and focus on facility repairs and other tasks. A flight transported 120 dogs and cats from Alabama to animal rescue and shelter partners in a safe location on the West Coast.

The period following a tornado is a difficult and chaotic one for people who may have lost everything they own, not to mention having to bear the pain of losing a beloved family member or pet.

Often after events like these, shelters see an increase in the number of animals who are either lost, or whose families have lost their homes and need to arrange temporary care for their beloved animals. In addition to freeing up space at the shelter for other animals in need, relocation gives these animals a second chance at finding forever homes. At the HSUS, we pivot at a moment's notice when disaster strikes. We train yearround, we maintain and upgrade our vehicles and

equipment, and we stay connected with local, state and federal emergency response authorities so we can best serve the affected communities. With many years of experience under our belt, we are well-equipped and ready to respond.

During hurricane season, we are called in to assist with many such events. Your support (CFC #11894) will make a big difference in helping us reach the most animals and ensure their safety during natural disasters and whenever animals need urgent rescue.

Many look to us when disasters and other emergencies arise. You make it possible for us to help them.

How To Save a Life for \$100


Kristy Scott has seen a lot during her 30 years of working in developing countries across the world for Childrens Food Fund/ World Emergency Relief. But even she was shocked when she met Exoce, a 4-year-old Congolese boy with a 10 lb. tumor on his kidney.

Scott was visiting Kaziba, a mountain village in DR Congo, where CFF/WER has worked for nearly a decade. The charity's long-term support in this community reflects its philosophy: provide relief when needed, but also provide the material support and expertise needed to strengthen a community over time and make it more resilient in the next crisis.

In this remote village, CFF/WER supports a doctor who has been working to improve the community's small, overburdened hospital. This is being accomplished through financial and educational support for Congolese doctors and providing medical equipment that can make a big difference.

A great example is a cauterizer, which Scott calls "such a simple tool. It looks like an electronic pen. It burns surgical incisions, greatly decreasing bleeding. It's one small item that has made a huge difference for this hospital and its patients"

and its patients."



Scott was in Congo to sit in on a surgery, to see her donors' dollars hard at work. The small group of Congolese doctors, travelling as part of a CFF/WER sponsored medical mission, performed 86 surgeries in one week. One memorable patient was Exoce, whose tumor weighed a third of his body weight. Scott was amazed when Exoce awoke



from his surgery and gave the thumbs-up sign. A few weeks later, when Exoce was back at home, he looked like a different boy.

"The surgeries we sponsor are often lifechanging. Exoce would have died. Each surgery, including medicines, supplies, doctors and hospital charges costs around \$100. Look at the impact such a relatively small sum of money can have on a child's life."

As hard and emotionally draining as it can be working in developing countries, seeing Exoce's recovery and the many other concrete signs of her charity's work is what has kept Scott at it for so many years. *"Passion and compassion keep me going. It's not easy work. But at the same time, it is extremely rewarding."*

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How to respond when disaster strikes

Technology has made it easy to respond almost immediately to a disaster anywhere in the world. You can give on Facebook or GoFundMe, by text, by clicking on an online ad. This is good: it can generate a lot of resources very quickly.

But is responding quickly the best way to help people and communities in need?

In a way, responding to a disaster is like responding to an emergency: often it's best to think before you act. Don't panic. Think about what you can do to help.

- **Give money if you can.** Money allows charities working on the ground "to quickly purchase the supplies they need to address the ever-changing needs of those affected," according to Charity Navigator, a site that rates many charities. Physical donations must be sorted, transported, stored and distributed. This all takes money.
- **Give locally if you can.** One problem with making a quick donation is that it often goes to one charity, the Red Cross. This certainly helps the Red Cross respond to a disaster and maintain its disaster-response capacity, which takes resources. But it may not be the best way to help the people and communities hurt by a specific disaster.

Often a local United Way or "community foundation" or will set up a fund specifically to respond to a local disaster. This may take a few days to set up, but your money will go to people who know their community and will be there over time.

their future for generations to come.

- Give to meet both short and long-term needs. When a disaster happens, the immediate needs are overwhelming: for rescue, food, shelter. But the harm is long-term: Individuals need to heal. Families and communities need to be rebuilt. This takes resources over time, sometimes years, as in Puerto Rico. This is why giving to local funds often makes sense. Plus, it can connect you to that community over time.
- Give to prevent the next disaster. In every state and most countries, there are charities working to prevent or mitigate disasters, often by protecting the local environment. There are also charities fighting climate change and its impact on disasters.
- **Give to real charities.** Before you give, make sure the charity you're supporting is an actual charity. This is easy. Go to **Guidestar.org** and do a search on the charity's name.
- Give in a way that is most helpful to the charities. A direct gift through a charity's online donation page is often the most efficient way to give. One problem with giving through Facebook, for example, is that your data goes to Facebook, not the charity. This makes it hard for charities to connect with and report to their donors.



Give to charities you already know and trust. Many national and international charities regularly respond to disasters. They often have existing connections to people on the ground in communities hit by a disaster, as well as connections to donor companies that can supply water, medicine and other critical supplies. You'll find much more advice about giving on **CharityChoices.com/donors.**







Connecting heart and mind when we give

For most of us, giving comes from the heart. We give because we care. We give because we're moved by a tragedy or an injustice or a story – perhaps the story of someone we know who died of cancer or struggles with disability.

But when we give, it's good to connect our hearts with our minds. That can help our giving have the most impact, no matter how much or little we have to give.

One useful way to think about giving away our money is how many think about investing money: **Diversify**. Don't put all your money into oil fields in Oklahoma....or a no-risk, lowinterest savings account.

In giving, this principle means:

- Support a range of charities: local and national, new and old, small and large.
- Support charities that work in many ways. For many people, "charity" means direct services to people in need: food, housing, scholarships. But charities work in many ways: they educate people about an issue or need, advocate for change, protect people's rights. There are many ways to make a difference.
- Invest in what you know. Supporting a few charities you know

and trust makes sense, and it's a very efficient way to give for you and the charities. You can see first-hand the impact of your donations.

- Take risks. "No risk, no gain." Over time, that safe lowinterest savings account doesn't generate a lot of money to live off in retirement. In the charity world, some of the greatest advances have been stimulated by newer, less well-known charities. Think about the impact that supporting Martin Luther King's Southern Christian Leadership Council in the 1960s had on America in the 21st century.
- Have a plan. A plan can be very simple: 25% to my congregation or a faith-based charity, 25% to my community, 25% to charities working on global warming, 25% to charities helping the poor in other countries. Or 33% for charities helping the hungry and homeless, 33% to charities advocating for policies to help the hungry and homeless, 33% to charities supporting research on Alzheimer's Disease.
- Don't invest before you verify. Would you invest in something based



on a phone call or letter? It's the same when you invest in a charity. Today it's easy to verify a charity: look it up on <u>GuideStar.org</u>, a database of every registered charity in the country. You can also learn how big and how old a charity is and, with a little more time, how much it spends on overhead.

Don't let your mind block your heart! Don't get bogged down worrying if you should support a certain charity. If it's doing work you care about and it's a real charity, support it.
