

As hard as the past few months have been, a silver lining has been Americans' willingness to help each other.

People see the needs the pandemic has caused. They sense what it's like to lose someone or to lose your job or business, even if it's not happened to them.

And people have responded. One in three have given directly to support a charity, individual or a business. Charity donations are up 7.5% this year, even though many who have lost their income can no longer give money.

We are all in this together.

nd we all have to continue to give as much as we can. Not just to the many charities that are responding directly to the pandemic (see our article on page 11). But also to the majority of charities that are continuing to do their critical work, in the face of the pandemic.

Animals still need rescuing. Medical research needs to continue. The environment needs protecting. The other needs don't go away.

And while giving is up, many charities rely on revenue from things like ticket sales, just like businesses. With revenue down, nearly a million nonprofit jobs have been lost in the

past six months, according to a recent report. This severely limits what many charities can do, just when they're most needed.

If you work for the government, the military or the Postal Service, a great way to support charities is by making a pledge through the **Combined Federal Campaign**.

Having a little deducted from every paycheck makes a huge difference for charities, giving them stable income throughout the year.



How many charities? How much is given? To what?

- In 2015 there were more than 1.184 million charities. However, most are inactive or have virtually no
 income. Only about 300,000 charities filed tax forms.
- In 2019, giving to charities totaled nearly \$450 billion, according to Giving USA. Individuals gave nearly \$310 billion, 69% of all giving.
- **Foundations** gave more than \$75 billion, 17% of total giving. The percentage given by foundations has gone up a lot the past two decades.
- The biggest recipient of charitable giving is religion: \$128 billion. Education received \$64 billion. Human services \$56 billion. Foundations \$53 billion. Health organizations \$41.5 billion. International affairs \$29 billion. Arts and culture \$21.5 billion. Environment and Animal protection: \$14 billion.
- Fewer Americans are giving: 73% in Gallup's 2020 survey. The previous low was 79% in 2009, during the recession.

How to save a child's life for \$80.50

The statistic is abstract and hard to fully grasp: 3.4 million children are suffering today from malnutrition in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

The boy, Iragi, is anything but abstract and hard to grasp.

"When we met Iragi, he hadn't eaten for days and was literally starving to death," says Kristy Scott, director of Children's Food Fund/World Emergency Relief (CFF/WER). "He had the body of a five-year-old and was in serious danger of organ failure." At the time, Iragi was 12.

Iragi was rushed to Lwiro Hospital and admitted to CFF/WER's malnutrition

program, allowing him to receive critical medical and nutritional care, all free.

It takes a long time for a child as malnourished as Iragi to recover. He was in WER's malnutrition program for three months, but is now back with his family and doing much better.


Scott estimates that three months of nutritional support for a child like Iragi costs just \$80.50. The cost is low because CFF/WER gets much of the food donated, plus they work with dedicated doctors and nurses who provide health care in villages around Lwiro and Kaziba.

CFF/WER (**CFC** #10984) works this way in 15 countries, mostly in Africa and Asia. Through its Native American outreach, it also provides food, water barrels and firewood to Navajo, Apache and Hopi populations. So far in 2020, it has shipped nearly four million pounds of disaster and COVID-19 relief supplies across the U.S. to help struggling Americans.

CFF/WER provides not just food but also life-saving medicine, water filters and agricultural supplies, with an overhead of less than 8% of donated resources.

For Scott, who's worked with CFF/WER for more than 30 years, the key is being aware of the causes of poverty and malnutrition and being able to focus on tangible solutions for real people and their communities.

"The extraordinary scale of suffering in a country like DR Congo is horrifying," Scott says. "Violence, hunger and disease are ever

present. It breaks my heart to have to admit that we can't save all the children.

"But seeing the impact of our efforts on children like Iragi is what keeps me going. It can be heart-breaking work, but also incredibly rewarding to know you've made a difference."



Rescuing Junior and thousands of other animals suffering from cruelty and neglect every year

Inside were three dogs huddled together, nearly all their fur missing

The call for help came from a local Sheriff's Office in Florida, which had gotten a tip about mistreated dogs. When the Humane Society's Animal Rescue Team arrived in the pouring rain at the densely-wooded, five-acre property, it found nearly 140 dogs, including several puppies housed in ramshackle, hutch-like structures. The hutch-



es were filthy, caked with feces, and leaking from the heavy rain.

There were no permanent buildings on the property, just a few campers packed with more dogs. Inside were three dogs huddled protectively together, nearly all of their fur missing. The animals suffered from severe neglect—some had no access to food and water and most had skin conditions characterized by missing fur, sores and itchy skin. The dogs were in need of medical attention and TLC. The Rescue Team took the dogs to a temporary animal shelter.

Like many, Junior, one of the dogs found on the property, had skin issues and needed food and water, which the team provided, making a world of difference in his recovery. He had been missing from his permanent family for more than a year. Junior scampered away for an adventure and, once he was lost, he couldn't find his way home. The family searched in vain.



Junior was one of more than 4,300 animals rescued from crisis situations last year.

When the family heard the story about the case, they sent photos and information to the Sheriff's Office, hoping their dog was one of the animals on the property. It was Junior. Their reunion was heartwarming. The smiles said it all, helping the Rescue Team's members remember why their difficult and often heart-breaking work is so important.


The Animal Rescue Team of The Humane Society of the United States (CFC #11894) works with law enforcement nationwide to investigate the worst cases of animal abuse. Every year, it rescues thousands of animals from puppy mills, animal fighting operations, natural disasters and other large-scale situations of cruelty and


neglect. As the team always finds with these rescues, some of the visibly suffering animals are understandably nervous when they face their rescuers, though most are resilient and bond immediately.

During natural disasters—which are happening constantly now— the team works with local agencies on pre-storm transports, developing evacuation plans and emergency rescue for animals caught in harm's way.

In 2019, the Animal Rescue Team of the **Humane Society U.S.** rescued 4,369 animals from crisis situations. It directly cared for more than 100,000 animals through its rescue team, veterinary programs and affiliated care centers and sanctuaries.

The vision motivating all this work on behalf of animals is in the charity's name: A humane society.

How charities are responding to the pandemic

Nearly every charity in the country has been affected by the pandemic, even if they're not directly responding to it. Just in the past six months, nearly a million nonprofit jobs were lost, according to a recent report.

One reason for this is that charities run like businesses in some ways, receiving revenue from their activities (such as ticket sales) as well as contracts to run programs (such as a drug rehab program supported by a city government). Like businesses, many charities have lost revenue during the pandemic, leading to program cuts and job losses.

At the same time, many charities are facing an unprecedented need for their services. This need has gotten a lot of attention in relation to food banks, most of which are serving far more people than in the past. But many other types of charities are also having to find ways to respond to the pandemic's impact on the people they help.

One example is charities helping people with diabetes and other kidney problems. These people "are facing enormous risks and challenges," said the president of the American Kidney Fund. "They are losing their jobs. They have had to stop using public transit to get to their treatments.... Patients with compromised immune systems need help obtaining groceries and other essentials safely."

Similarly, charities helping people with autism are responding to "widespread disruptions to the daily lives of autistic children, teens and adults," according to Autism Speaks.

In the DC area, the Arlington Free Clinic (CFC #86926) says that many of the patients it serves "have already lost their jobs in construction, restaurants, cleaning and childcare and are struggling with access to food, transportation and other emergency needs. Very few will benefit from federal government support."

"Like the rest of the country, COVID-19 turned AFC's world upside down, but unlike most places, we can't shut down."

American Kidney Fund (CFC #11404)

The AKF Coronavirus Emergency Fund is providing \$250 grants to any U.S. dialysis

or recent kidney transplant patient in financial need to help them cope with the pandemic. AKF provided financial assistance to 84,000 people living with kidney failure last year.

Autism Speaks (CFC #12413)

Autism Speaks has been working with other autism organizations and researchers to develop tools that can help people with autism through this crisis.



Food for the Hungry (CFC #11732)

This charity is using its 50-year history of focusing on health and hygiene to help the communities in which it works protect themselves from COVID-19. This has involved both providing things like clean water and soap as well as finding innovative ways to teach prevention strategies in these communities, which are in Africa, Asia and Latin America.

The \$300 Donation **Deduction**

To encourage giving to charities during this time of crisis, the CARES Act created a \$300 deduction that anyone who doesn't itemize their deductions — about 85% of Americans — can take.

This deduction is only for this year. Donations must be in cash, not donations of items such as clothes or furniture. No special documentation is needed, just a record of your donation, such as a canceled check.

Charities have been urging Congress to pass a permanent charitable deduction for nonitemizers. The 2017 tax overhaul doubled the standard deduction. As a result, far fewer people itemize their deductions. Many believe this has depressed charitable giving.

Food For The Poor (CFC #10328)

Since mid-March, Food For The Poor has shipped 709 tractor-trailer loads of aid to the countries it serves, including 200 containers specifically for COVID-19 relief. FFTP focuses on Caribbean and Latin American countries.

Humane Society of the U.S. (CFC #11894)

The Humane Society launched the COVID-19 Relief Fund to support animal shelters, rescue groups and other organizations that are responding to the economic impacts of the COVID-19 outbreak. Its goal is to keep people and their pets together during this crisis. Contributions provide veterinary care, pet food, horse feed and animal care supplies, as well as other costs related to caring for animals during the outbreak.

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (CFC #11685)

UUSC' focus has always been on social justice and human rights, principles that also define its response to COVID. It's providing as much support as it can to its partners working in places like Bangladesh, Guatemala and Honduras, all of which face greater needs. It helps its partners take collective action and monitor human rights abuses stemming from the pandemic and economic instability.


