Why Your Gift Makes a Difference

With so much need in the world, with so many wealthy donors making big donations, does it really matter if you give?

Without a doubt, it does. Giving by individuals still makes up more than 67% of money given to charities in this country, with most of this coming from those of us who can't make huge donations.

What you give adds up with what many others give: \$15 to

a charity helping fight hunger in Colombia, for example, feeds a family for almost two weeks. Combined with other donors, hundreds of families can be fed until they can find jobs and feed themselves.

It's the same for every charity: regular gifts from average donors add up to big impacts: people fed, the homeless housed, animals saved, nature preserved, cures discovered, rights protected. Your giving makes a difference, whichever charities you choose to support.

People coming together to help others is what makes a workplace charity drive like the **Combined Federal Campaign** so important: it pools the gifts of thousands of donors, most of whom give regularly by having a little deducted from each paycheck. This adds up to a big impact for CFC charities.

And for you, giving through the CFC means that the charities you support have all met several



accountability standards, such as an annual audit. You can focus on which charities you want to support.



Will we wake up tomorrow?

"One day we woke up and our daughter, Ariana, asked, 'Will we wake up tomorrow?' Without hesitation, we packed our things and moved to a safer place."

Ariana and her parents are three of an estimated 6.2 million Ukrainians who have fled their country, mostly women and children. It's the worst refugee crisis in Europe since WWII.

And it's far from over, despite less media attention. In some ways, it's getting worse. "What worries me so much is that the crisis is going to get worse as winter comes," explains Kristy Scott, CEO of Children's Food Fund/World Emergency Relief (CFC #10984).

Since March, CFF/WER has delivered more than \$11 million in desperately needed relief supplies to help refugee

children, families and the elderly, in Poland and Moldova as well as internally-displaced people in Ukraine. This has included food, hygiene products and household items, such as mattresses. In Ukraine, it has included water filtration equipment for families starting to rebuild their homes, the same type of help CFF/WER provides to communities in many other parts of the world.

It has also provided gifts for children, such as the paint set Ariana is holding. The gifts for children have special meaning, says a person delivering the aid and documenting Ukrainians' stories. "As we talked with Maryana, her children took apart the packages we

brought and just jumped for happiness and screamed for joy. Such moments are simply priceless."

The trauma young Ukrainian children have experienced is profound. Vika remembered how her granddaughter came into their room when the bombing began saying, "Mom, the war has started." Vika said she and her daughter "didn't close our eyes for three nights, not for a second. Our granddaughter endured it very hard. Now she has such stress, with health problems."

CFF/WER has been helping people in need — around the world and in Native

American communities in the U.S. — for more than 30 years. It works with on-the-ground partners in each community, which helps keep its overhead very low: just 3.3% in 2021.


Its experience and connections allow it to move quickly when crises arrive, as they did in Ukraine. It also works with communities for years, helping them rebuild or become more self-reliant.

"The impact of crises like Ukraine will be felt for years," explains Scott. "It is critical to stay with these people over time, to help them recover and eventually thrive."

Even in the most trying times, Autism Speaks advocates for military families like Sophia and Alivia's family

Revered political leader and activist Nelson Mandela once said: "The greatest glory in living lies not in never falling, but in rising every time we fall."

For Sarah, wife of an a United States Air Force Chaplain and mother of two girls with autism, no quote could better describe her family's journey over the last 13 years. It was only through their strong values that her family was able to withstand setbacks that would bring most to their knees.

Although their autism affects them differently, sisters Alivia, 13, and Sophia, 8, share similar stories of overcoming adversity to reach milestones that many specialists never thought they would.

"Sophia has faced challenges and obstacles from birth but has continued to overcome," Sarah explains. "She was unable to walk and barely able to eat until her second birthday. She didn't say her first word (momma) until she was four.

"But with two years of intense early intervention and full-time ABA therapy in a clinical setting, Sophia's vocabulary is amazing, she has friends, loves ballet and even plays soccer!" (ABA is a therapy based on the science of learning and behavior.)

"Alivia had a neonatal stroke, which caused her to have many medical issues throughout childhood. At first, her autism was masked by her medical condition, but she was diagnosed around her second birthday. She didn't speak until she was six, but now talks and reads thanks to intense therapies."

Sarah's husband, Tamer, is an active duty service member. His career has

> caused his family to move several times over the years, but she says the military has gone above and beyond to make sure her girls have everything they need to thrive no matter where they're stationed.



"All branches of the military have a designated program for special needs families. Among many other services, we receive 40 hours a month of respite care and in-home ABA therapy for both girls. We are proud to be a part of the military family."

How to respond to a crisis like Hurricane lan

Many people who are moved by the human cost of a major disaster such as Hurricane Ian want to help. Here are ideas to help you make sure your help is effective.


- Think before you give. With today's technology, it's easy to make a quick gift, through Facebook, GoFundMe, by text or by clicking on an online ad. But the best way to respond to a disaster is a little like responding to an emergency: often it's better to think before you act. Don't panic. Think about how you can best respond.
- **Give money if you can.** Money allows charities working on the ground to buy the supplies they need to meet the often quickly changing needs of those affected. In contrast, physical donations must be sorted, transported, stored and distributed. This all takes resources.
- **Give locally.** One problem with making a quick donation is that it often goes to one charity, the Red Cross. This certainly helps the Red Cross respond to a disaster and maintain its disaster-response capacity. But it may not be the best way to help the people and communities hurt by a specific disaster.

Often a local United Way or community foundation will set up a fund specifically to respond to a local disaster. In Florida for example, the local United Way and the Southwest Florida Community Foundation has set up a fund to respond to Ian (collaboratory.org/SWFLEmergencyReliefFund). The Humane Society Naples is working to help animals impacted by the hurricane.

The Florida Disaster Fund has been set up by the state and the Volunteer Florida Foundation to help people throughout the state (VolunteerFlorida.org).

In Central Florida, the Heart of Florida United Way has set up a fund to help those impacted by the severe flooding caused by Ian in this part of Florida. The Catholic Church of Central Florida has also set up the Florida Relief Fund for Hurricane Ian.

In Ukraine, the Center for Civil Liberties (<u>CCL.org.ua</u>) is working to document Russian war crimes and thus prevent future war crimes. It was recently awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for its work.


Give to real charities.





How much do Americans give?

Americans' willingness to help others was shown dramatically during the pandemic, with giving rising 7.4% between 2019 and 2021, up to \$488 billion. This is a real increase, after inflation.

Of this total, 67% was given by individuals, or nearly \$327 billion. The rest comes from foundations (19%), corporations (4%) and bequests (9%).

Much of this increase was driven by new donors. In 2020, 7.3% more Americans made a donation.

The long-term trend is not as positive. In 2000, 66% of all households made donations. It dropped to under 50% in 2018. Many people under 40 haven't begun to give regularly: only 33% gave in 2018. Another factor: fewer people regularly attending religious services.

Many experts worry about another long-term trend: the increasing importance of mega-gifts, individuals who give more than \$450 million. These gifts – from billionaire donors such as MacKenzie Scott and Elon Musk – added up to nearly \$15 billion in 2021, or 5% of all individual giving.

The role of large private foundations has also grown rapidly. In 1980, foundations accounted for just 6% of all giving. It is now nearly 20%. Many worry this will give the wealthy more influence over which charities get supported.

The increase in individuals making large donations has already led to an explosion of "donor-advised funds." Wealthy individuals create a fund that will give away a certain amount each year. In essence, this fund is like a mini foundation, giving the individual or family some control over how the money they donated is used over time. The category dominated by donor-advised funds (called "public society benefit groups") has shot up 35% during the past two years, five times the overall increase in giving.
